CONDUCTOR'S NOTES

Messiah, by G.F. Handel, is generally considered one of the finest pieces of music ever written. It is even more remarkable when considering he wrote the entire piece (nearly 3 hours long) in about three and a half weeks. It is full of beautiful melodies, carefully crafted musical ideas that always seem to perfectly suit the text, and most impressively, complex fugues throughout, with melodies seamlessly interwoven between different voice and instrumental parts. It is a monumental achievement, well worthy of its fame.

Handel has received well-deserved acclaim both during his life and perhaps even more since his death. But perhaps the under-appreciated artist behind this work is the compiler of the text (the "librettist"), Charles Jennens. He collaborated with Handel on several other masterworks, but was particularly proud of this text. And more critically, he put it together with a much higher purpose than any of his other texts. Jennens was concerned with the sacred truths of Christianity which he perceived were increasingly under attack during the scientific revolution and rapidly changing culture of the 18th century.

He was concerned that in the so-called "age of reason," the mystery behind the Word of God was in danger of being lost in the hearts and mind of followers of Jesus. Perhaps this concept sounds familiar! Truly we are called to approach God's Word with our whole selves, including our intellects. We are called to be transformed by the power of Holy Spirit, having "renewed minds" so that "by testing we may discern the will of God." (Romans 12:2) But the cultural shift that we have all witnessed over the past decades and

centuries seems to leave very little room for mystery. It is as though we have adopted the idea that if we can't explain it, it must not be true.

This type of thinking, however, is pretty small. Do we honestly think we can adequately explain the endless reaches of a universe that contains innumerable stars and galaxies? Have we convinced ourselves that we can explain the miracle of birth, or the beautiful symphonic-like dance between the seasons and the cycle of life, death, and rebirth of the plants and animals around us? Can science explain the way we feel in our hearts when we experience something beautiful, whether a sight, a sound, or perhaps even in a relationship?

So how can we expect to explain the mystery of God redeeming the world by sending His Son to be born as a baby, that He might live the perfect life we can't; that He might die the death we deserve, taking our sin on the cross; that He might rise again to defeat sin and death once and for all; that He might return at the proper time to finally and forever free His children and this good world from the stain and pain of darkness, sin, and death?

Charles Jennens understood that Christians must accept a great deal of mystery, because God's Word, His world, and His plan for saving it are too much for us to fully grasp. If we claim to fully understand it all then we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.

When Jennens put together this text – which is a compilation of some of the most critical passages from the Bible, especially with regards to the all-important topic of our Messiah, Jesus Christ – he expressed his hope that Handel would "lay out his whole genius and Skill upon it, that the Composition may excel all his former Compositions, as the Subject excells every other Subject. The Subject is Messiah."

And that is why we are presenting this concert tonight. It is in praise of our Savior, the Messiah, Jesus Christ, the subject that excels every other subject, the Name above every other name. It is to honor the mystery of God's plan for saving the world through Jesus. As we celebrate the most beautiful season of the year, we seek to embrace and celebrate the mystery of the incarnation of Christ.

We must learn to accept things we cannot explain. Yes, we are made in the image of God, but no, we are not equal to Him. As Paul writes in Romans, "Oh, the depth of the riches and wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his judgments and how inscrutable his ways! For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him by glory forever. Amen." (Romans 11:33, 36)
